

COLLECT OF THE WEEK

O God, for our redemption You gave Your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross and by His glorious resurrection delivered us from the power of the enemy. Grant that all our sin may be drowned through daily repentance and that day by day we may arise to live before You in righteousness and purity forever; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DID YOU KNOW?

Propitiation is the act of assuming guilt and punishment for someone else (you did not commit the crime, but take the punishment as if you had). Jesus Christ is the propitiation of our sins. He assumed our guilty verdict and punishment for our sins when He died on the cross. Jesus did/does not commit sin, He is the only One who can hold the Law perfectly. It is through His death that we are sanctified.

Sanctification is the process of becoming holy, that is, spiritual growth which follows justification. We are justified through Jesus' death on the cross. By believing—having faith that Jesus paid the price for our sins, we are led to lead holy lives.
